COURSE DESCRIPTION: Literary texts and other forms of media have been associated in a fascinating relation in many works of French literature. Through an in-depth study of interdisciplinary theoretical texts focused on illustration, art, and photography, this course aims to explore word and image relations in the analysis of literature. In recent years, word and image relations have been an emerging interest in interdisciplinary studies, and as such, they will serve as a basis for our analysis of literature. This course will also seek to explore the practical and methodological implications of word and image studies, to better understand the challenges of studying literature in the era of the "pictorial turn" and the dominance of visuality.

Assignments and Evaluation:

The "Overall Assessment" component of this course will be based on, but not limited to, the following criteria: Contributions to class discussions are frequent, demonstrate a high degree of reflection, are relevant to the course material, and are pertinent to the discussion topics; Student maintains positive interactions with the instructor and classmates (does not interrupt or keep others from speaking during discussions); Student successfully demonstrates that course readings are completed through contributions to course activities; Short homework assignments are completed in a timely manner (by the assigned deadline, if applicable); Student seeks the help and advice of the instructor during office hours, etc.
