

FSL 315H LEC0101 Fall 2022 French Oral Communication for Professional and Academic Contexts

Course Instructor: Prof. Marie-Anne Visoi

Class Meeting Time: Tuesdays, 11:10-2:00 PM (three hours per week)

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Course Description:

This course is designed for students who wish to develop their oral communication skills in French in preparation for bilingual employment, community service, and academic activities in Canada and abroad. Emphasis is placed on the development of skills for accurate oral language use in professional and academic contexts: researched oral presentations, debates, interviews, and student-led discussions. Students will learn how to adapt their speaking style and register to different audiences and situations, use appropriate vocabulary, and self-correct.

Required texts and materials: a bilingual dictionary; a selection of online course materials and resources will be available in Quercus.

Prerequisite: FSL221Y1 (63%) or, upon first FRE/FSL, enrolment equivalent as determined by

the French Placement Test

Exclusion: FSL321Y1/FSL320Y and higher. Not open to fluent and native speakers of French.

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Learning Objectives

By the end of this course, learners should be able to:

- a) introduce themselves orally and answer various questions correctly in preparation for a job interview in French
- b) engage effectively in various types of communicative situations in everyday academic and professional contexts: present a point of view, support an opinion, participate in a debate, etc.
- c) be able to use appropriate vocabulary in a variety of settings
- d) improve their oral communication skills by paying attention to clear oral expression, correct pronunciation, and grammar, and by reflecting critically on their own oral competence

e) explore a variety of French and Francophone cultural and linguistic elements related to

Course Expectations

Each class starts at 11:10AM and ends at 2PM. Regular attendance and informed, active participation in all class activities will be expected of all students. Assignments and Evaluation

In-class Oral Presentation (25%) Due date: September 27-October 11

This test will assess the students' oral competency in French. The in-class presentation (approx. 3-5 minutes in duration) will be based on a brief introduction (name, interest in French, future goals) followed by short answers to three questions in preparation for an internship or for a job interview. Additional details about this assignment, a list of questions and an Oral Presentation Rubric will be posted in the course website, during the second week. Examples of questions will be practised in class in order to help students prepare their oral presentation as they reflect on their education in French, experiences, and future objectives for using French. Students should ensure that they are not reading a prepared text. In order to speak clearly and expressively, students are strongly advised to practise several times, then record themselves at home and listen to their own recording before their in-class presentation. **Notes are allowed.**

Online Vocabulary Test (25%) Due date: November 1st

This timed Online Vocabulary Test will be based on the vocabulary studied in the course during weeks 1-7. The test will assess students' knowledge of the vocabulary studied as well as their ability to use appropriate vocabulary in various types of communicative situations in everyday academic and professional contexts. Students will have 60 minutes to answer 30 questions

(multiple choice, define a word, synonyms and antonyms, words in context, etc.). Additional details about this assignment and examples of questions will be posted in the course website, during week five. **No aids are allowed for this test.**

In-class Individual Interviews (30%) Due dates: November 29; December 6

The In-class Individual Interviews (5-7 minutes per person in duration) will be scheduled in the two final course sessions and will take place in our classroom, CARR HALL 406, between 11:10 -2PM. Students will need to confirm the date and time of their interviews before Reading week. This test will assess the students' oral competency and oral comprehension skills, knowledge of vocabulary and grammar studied in the course, according to the In-class Individual Interview Rubric posted in the Course website during weeks 9 and 10. From the list of 20 questions/topics distributed to students **two weeks** before the Individual Interviews, 3-4 questions will be selected for each student by the instructor the day of the scheduled interview. Students are strongly encouraged to prepare rigorously for this assignment by a) researching and preparing all the questions/topics from the list provided by the instructor; b) reviewing their self-evaluation and oral language activities completed throughout the semester; c) practicing their oral communication skills; d) consulting the Individual Interview Rubric. In order to speak clearly and expressively, students are strongly advised to practise several times, then record themselves and listen to their own recording before their In-class Individual Interviews. **Notes are allowed.**

Overall Assessment (20%) On-going

This portion of the grade includes:

- regular attendance and completion of all major assignments on time 10%
- demonstrated effort throughout the course (knowledge of required material; completion of self-evaluation exercises); preparedness for each class and active participation – 10%

Since this is an oral communication course which takes place once a week, regular attendance is required. Students are expected to come prepared to initiate discussion and add constructive, insightful comments and contributions to class discussions and activities, as well as listen attentively to the instructor/others' comments and perspectives in a respectful manner. This includes being 'present in the moment' without outside distractions (e.g., texting, surfing the Internet, unless it is part of a class activity). If an absence is unavoidable, please contact the course instructor.

TESTS AND ASSIGNMENTS - IMPORTANT NOTES

Your final mark will be based solely on the assigned tests and overall assessment mentioned above – no additional assignments are possible under any circumstances. Should you miss any of the tests due to illness or major circumstances beyond your control, you must contact your instructor and inform your registrar as soon as possible. For tests missed due to any other major circumstance, you must provide a letter from your registrar. For details regarding marking criteria, please consult the attached Grading regulations.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

You must make every effort to complete assigned work on time in order to avoid late submission penalties.
